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Executive Summary

This Gravenhurst Situational Analysis is being completed as part of the Town of Gravenhurst Economic Development Strategy. This report is an informational piece crafted in 2024 and does not prescribe a certain solution; instead, it presents a statistical perspective within the local context. The data presented in this report does not tell the entire story of the Town – input from the community matters and will help to supplement the rest of the story.

This Community Analysis begins with an assessment of the people (sociodemographics) that make up Gravenhurst to provide a snapshot of the local population and highlight potential future opportunities. This data can be used to inform decision-making; for example, Gravenhurst has a sizable population of residents over the age of 60 (i.e., nearing retirement or retired), which, if this demographic remains, suggests the Town may soon require an increase in seniors' amenities.

Next, by profiling housing and income levels, a snapshot is created of the Town's current "livability". Notably, although Town residents have slightly lower median and average salaries compared to their Ontario counterparts, affordability in Gravenhurst is better. This is seen by only 20% of residents spending over 30% of their income on housing, compared to 28% of Ontario residents doing the same.

Section 3 pivots to an assessment of the local labour force, presenting key performance indicators related to participation, unemployment, and employment rates of various local population cohorts. Though this data is not prescriptive (i.e., suggesting solutions), only descriptive (i.e., reflective of the current situation), further introspection may identify ways to close any labour gaps.

Section 4 of the Situational Analysis reviews the Town's economy using the reverse lens; rather than assessing data based on local residents (regardless of where they work), this section reviews data based on local industry and





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employment data, regardless of where their employees live. Once more, an assessment by industry is done to identify key industries and jobs that can be leveraged to support future community goals and aspiration, and match them up with current, and emerging, community and economic drivers.

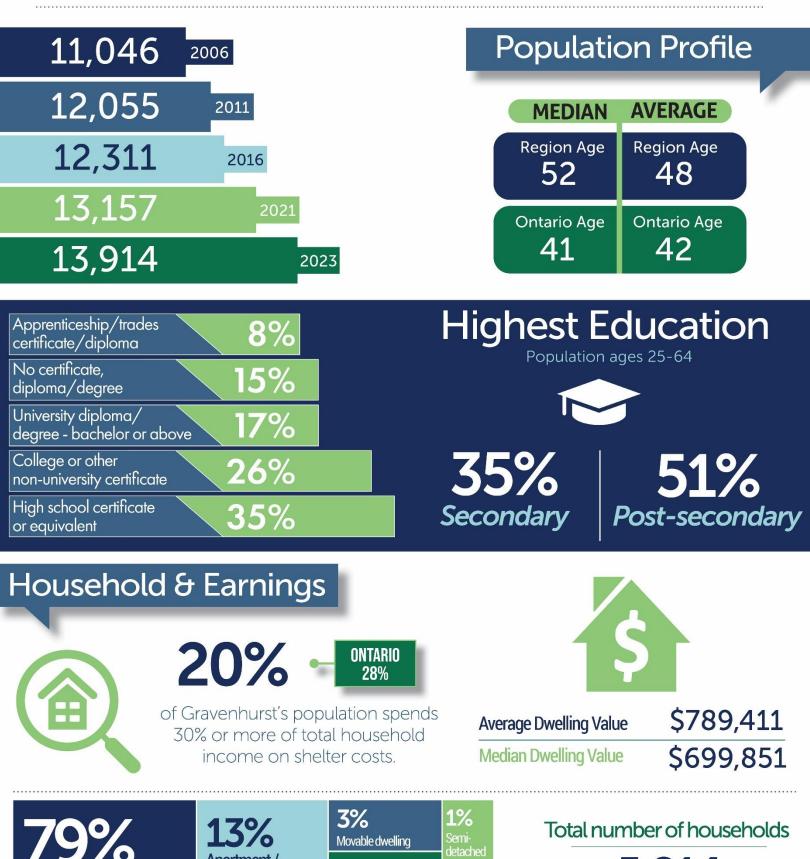
Finally, Section 5 presents the same information as is highlighted in Section 4 but focuses on Gravenhurst's Economic Region (the area where residents commute into and out of Gravenhurst consistently for work) rather than **just** Gravenhurst.

Later reports, as part of the broader Economic Development Strategy, will highlight opportunities based on this quantitative information alongside qualitative assessments derived from consultations with local stakeholders.

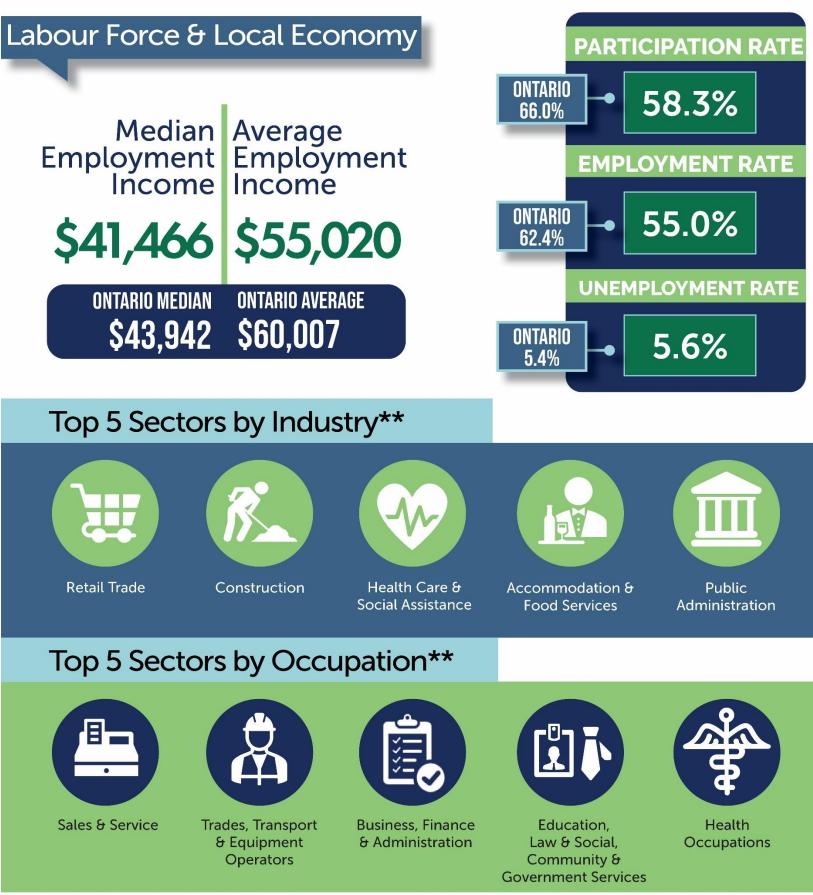

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2. Demographic Analysis

2.1. Population Growth

This subsection illustrates population characteristics for the Town of Gravenhurst. The wider economic landscape relevant to the region is explored by using **Ontario as a benchmark.**

Table 1 illustrates population changes in Gravenhurst from 2011 to 2033, compared to Ontario. From 2006 to 2016 the local population grew at a slower rate than the provincial average, however from 2016 to 2021 it surpassed provincial rates. This quicker rate of growth is expected to continue, with the Town projected to rise to slightly above 15,000 residents by 2033, averaging slightly higher growth than Ontario as a whole over that period.

The population in Gravenhurst is projected to rise above 15,000 residents by 2033.

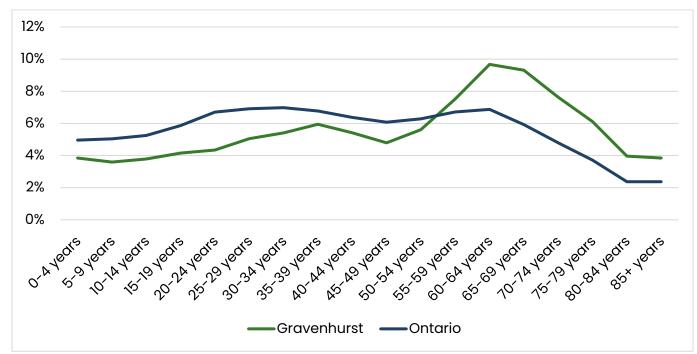


Figure 1: Percent Population by Age, Gravenhurst vs. Ontario, 2023.

Figure 1 contrasts the age profile of residents in Gravenhurst and Ontario, in 2023. Gravenhurst has a lower percentage of youth (0-19) and middle aged adults (20-55) compared to Ontario, with a much larger older population (55+ individuals). Specifically, Gravenhurst residents aged 55 and over represent nearly half (48%) of the local population compared to a third (33%) of all Ontario residents.

Overall, Gravenhurst' working-age population (ages 15-64, 57.9%) is lower than Ontario's (65.6%). Similarly, Gravenhurst' median (48, compared to 41 for Ontario) and average (52, compared to 42 for Ontario) ages are higher than Ontario's.¹

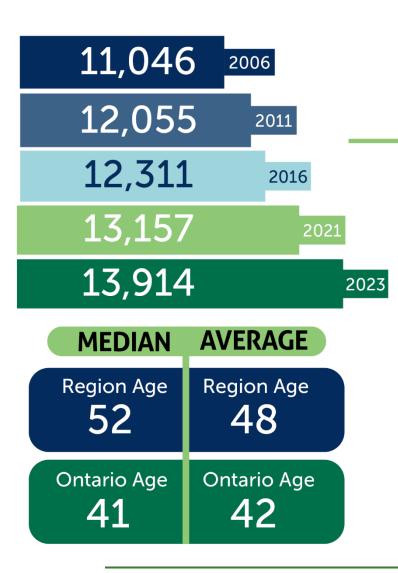

THE BOTTOM LINE

- After a decade of slow growth, the Town's population is seeing growth rates higher than that of the provincial mark, a trend that is expected to continue through 2033.
- Gravenhurst has a current population that is significantly older than Ontario's (median age of 48 compared to 41 in Ontario).
- The Town has a lower relative population of youth (11% of residents are ages 0-14, compared to 15% in Ontario) and middle aged individuals (26% of residents are ages 20-44, 33% provincially).



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2.2. Income, Households and Attainability

This subsection describes income, households and housing costs of the population. This information is relevant within the context of economic development planning because it provides an understanding of whether a region has attainable housing for resident labour – a key factor in residential and labour force attraction and retention. Concerning employment income, the following observations can be made²:

- In 2022, Gravenhurst' median employment income was \$41,466, 6.0%
 lower than in Ontario (\$43,942).
- In 2022, the average employment income for Gravenhurst residents was
 \$55,020, 9.1% lower than Ontario's (\$60,007).

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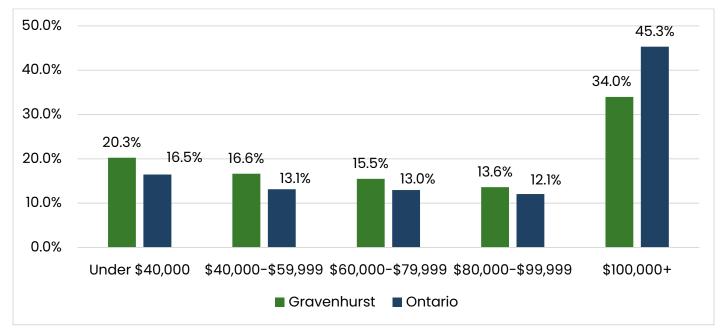


Figure 2: Household Income Levels by Percentage of the Population, 2023.

Figure 2 illustrates the distribution of household incomes. Approximately 66.1% of households in Gravenhurst earn less than \$100,000, compared to 54.8% in Ontario.

- Median household total income in Gravenhurst: \$85,162 vs. \$96,552 in Ontario.
- Average household total income in Gravenhurst: \$104,364 vs. \$123,610 in Ontario.

Residents in Gravenhurst have slightly lower levels of employment and household income compared to Ontario. The Town, though, offers more favourable costs of living, with lower dwelling values and monthly shelter costs. Table 3 and Figure 3 highlight key housing characteristics-compared to Ontario. Gravenhurst has a slightly lower cost of housing, with greater housing ownership, leading to fewer residents spend over 30% of their total income on shelter costs.

Of Gravenhurst's population spends 30% or more of total household income on shelter costs.

- In 2022 Gravenhurst residents had lower median and average incomes than their Ontario counterparts.
- This difference was offset by Gravenhurst' more comparative affordability. Only 20% of residents are spending 30% or more of total income on shelter costs, compared to 28% of Ontario residents.
- This suggests that while Gravenhurst residents earn slightly less than Ontario residents as a whole, their quality of life and affordability is higher.
- A high percentage of household ownership may suggest that those who cannot afford home ownership (and therefore rent) may struggle finding stable housing opportunities.



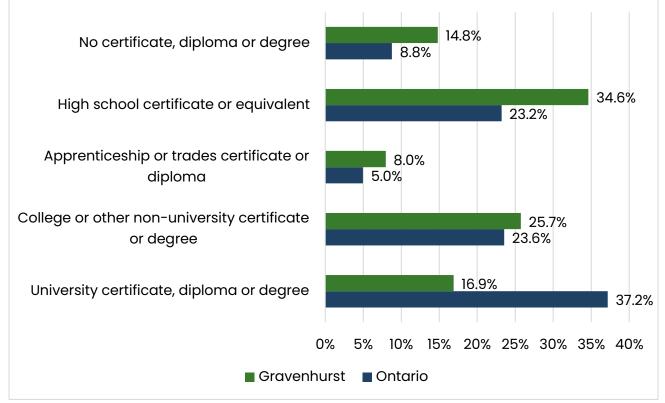


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2.3. Education, Skills and Training

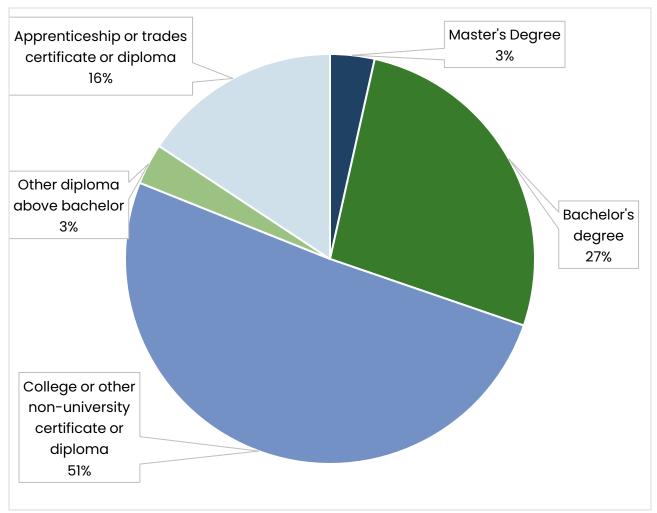


Figure 5: Type of Degree, by Percentage of Residents aged 24-65 with Post-Secondary Attainment, 2023.

This subsection reviews the level of education and major fields of study for residents of Gravenhurst and Ontario. Figures 4 and 5 outline the education levels obtained by Gravenhurst residents ages 25-64, as compared to Ontario.³

Figure 5 illustrates the post-secondary educational attainment of Gravenhurst residents ages 25 to 64. Post-secondary attainment suggests that:

- A total of 3,476 residents aged 25 to 64 have post-secondary education.
- For those people with a post-secondary education, a college degree is the most common type of education; attained by just over half - 51% -(attained by 1,769 residents), aged 25 to 64.
- Just over one out of four residents (27%) with post-secondary attainment, aged 25 to 64, has a bachelor's degree.

Table 4 illustrates the major fields of study⁴ for all residents 15 years and older. It is collected for the highest certificate, diploma or degree above the secondary school level. The largest fields of study in the population are 'Health professions and related programs;' and 'Business, management, marketing and related support.'⁵

THE BOTTOM LINE

- Gravenhurst residents aged 25-64 are more likely to have a high school certificate, apprenticeship or trades certificate, or college or other non-university certificate or degree compared to Ontario residents.
- This suggests that businesses relying on more technical skills learned at nonuniversity post-secondary institutions or those who rely on on-the-job training are more likely to find relevant skills and educational levels among the available labour pool.



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3. Labour Force Profiling and Analysis

3.1. Key Indicators

Gravenhurst has a labour force of **7,205** individuals. Gravenhurst has lower participation (58.3% compared to 66.0%) and employment (55.0%/62.4%) rate, and a comparable unemployment rate (5.6%/5.4%) relative to Ontario. This is to be expected given the general older population in Gravenhurst, as it suggests that many residents are outside the labour force (lower participation rate). A similar unemployment rate does suggest that those individuals who are looking for work are finding it at a similar rate than their Ontario counterparts.

Gravenhurst has a lower participation rate than Ontario, suggesting some older residents may not be active in the workforce.

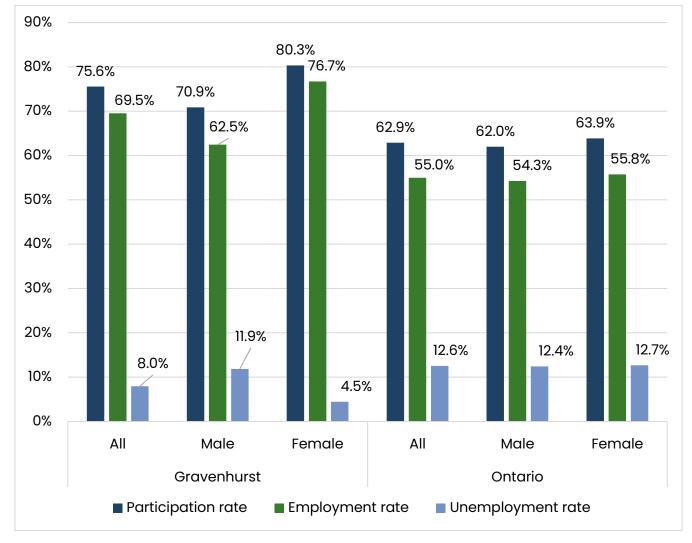


Figure 6: Labour Force Statistics by Gender, Population 15 to 24, 2023.

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Key labour force indicators are broken down by age and gender in Figure 6 and used to highlight underemployed/underutilized labour groups. Gravenhurst has a higher youth participation rate, suggesting that Gravenhurst' youth are significantly interested in engaging in the labour force. The gap is wider for females (16.4% higher than the provincial rate) than for males (still 8.0% higher). Altogether, this information suggests that local youth are quite interested in entering the labour force, with three out of four (75.6%) participating in the economy.

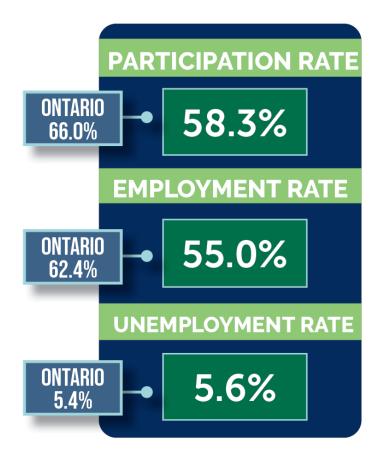

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THE BOTTOM LINE



- Gravenhurst's participation rate is lower than their provincial counterparts (58.3% compared to 66.0%).
- This is likely explained by Gravenhurst's higher average and median ages. That is, it is likely that a much larger percentage of Gravenhurst's residents are retired and therefore not engaged in the labour force.
 N.B. There are other possible explanations, this is just a likelihood given the age distribution of the population.
- Youth participation rates are much higher than their provincial counterparts (75.6% in Gravenhurst, 62.9% provincially).





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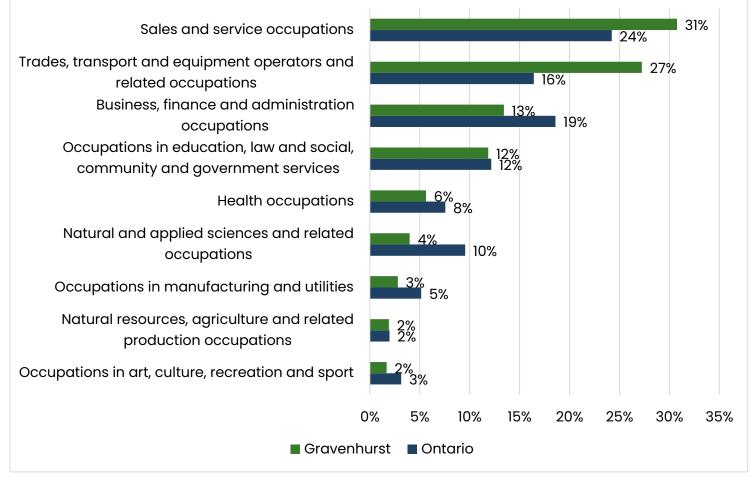
3.2. Labour Supply in Gravenhurst

Persons in the labour force can be classified using the National Occupational Classification (NOCs) codes; a four-tiered hierarchical arrangement of occupational groups with successive levels of disaggregation. It contains broad occupational categories (1-digit), major (2-digit code), minor (3-digit code) and unit groups (4-digit code).

Figure 7 shows that Gravenhurst residents most commonly work in:

- Sales and service occupations.
- Trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations.

The number of part-time and full-time workers also helps identify potential labour force engagement and supply. In Gravenhurst, 49.4% of employed individuals typically worked full-time while 50.6% worked part-time. This is slightly different than Ontario where 54.5% of individuals typically worked fulltime and 45.5% worked part-time.

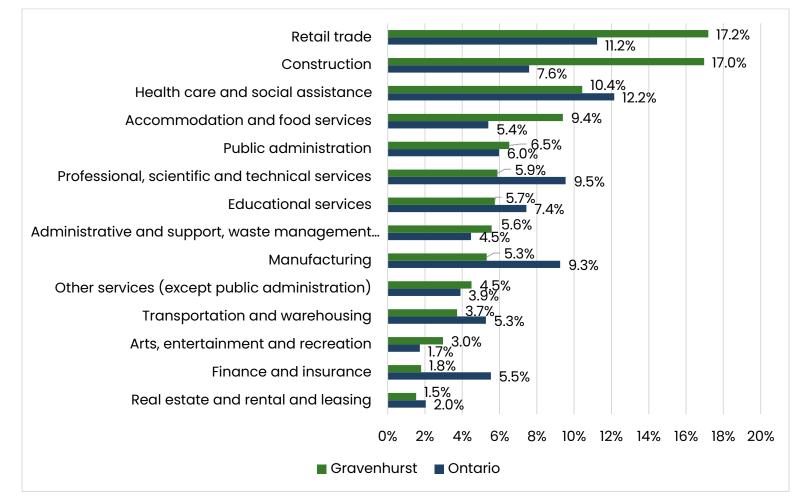
Figure 8 illustrates the industries in Gravenhurst that represent at least 1.0% of all local employment. Gravenhurst has larger labour concentrations relative to Ontario in several sectors, but most prominently in retail trade (17.2% locally compared to 11.2% across Ontario and construction (17.0% locally, 7.6% across Ontario). Concentrations (Location Quotient) are explored in Sections 4.5 and 5.5.

THE BOTTOM LINE

- Nearly three in five (58%) of Gravenhurst residents are working in either sales and service occupations or trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations.
- Gravenhurst residents are slightly less likely to have worked full-time in 2023 compared to Ontario residents. Just under half of working residents worked full-time.

3.3. Labour Market Gaps/Surpluses

Labour market gaps/surpluses are a measure of how well local labour supply meets local demand. Total occupational demand is difficult to map, as businesses change and alter demand based on a variety of factors (i.e., season, economic/financial outlook, technology, resource availability, etc.). The total number of jobs is used as a proxy for current occupational demand. Similarly, labour supply for a given occupation can be difficult to calculate since skills could be considered adaptable and could supply several occupations. Here, the resident labour force that has worked in an occupation (it is their current position or the position of the longest duration in the past year), is used as a proxy for local occupational supply.

The labour market gap/surplus is defined as the difference between the number of jobs (i.e., demand by occupation) in Gravenhurst and the number of workers living in Gravenhurst that worked/work in that occupation (i.e., local supply). There are approximately 10.7% more workers than jobs in Gravenhurst, making the area a net exporter of labour. Specifically, in Gravenhurst, there is a net surplus of approximately **698 workers**.

An occupation where the number of jobs in the local economy is less than the number of workers is considered to have a labour surplus. In Gravenhurst, three occupations have labour surpluses of over 100 workers:

- Trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations (511 more residents working in the sector, compared to the number of jobs).
- Sales and service occupations (294).
- Occupations in education, law and social, community and government services (107).

In Gravenhurst, there are **no occupations** with a labour market gap over 100 individuals – where there are over 100 more jobs than workers available in the local economy.





These surpluses are only an approximation since local demand could be higher than the total number of jobs (i.e., there may be unfilled positions), and supply could be higher if we account for persons who have transferable skills and could potentially fill other occupations. Nevertheless, the results in Table 8 indicate the direction and magnitude of local labour market imbalances⁶.

The same type of analysis can be done for labour supply and demand for local industries. The industries with the largest labour surpluses (Table 9) are:

- Retail trade (404 more workers than jobs).
- Construction (255).
- Professional, scientific and technical services (181).
- Educational services (164).
- Transportation and warehousing (137).

THE BOTTOM LINE

- There are approximately 648 (11%) more workers in Gravenhurst across industries and occupations compared to available jobs within the Town.
- This surplus of labour suggests that Gravenhurst provides a portion of its local labour to external communities to fulfill labour demands.

3.4. Workforce Commuting Flow

This subsection aims to identify the most probable labour force recruitment area for Gravenhurst using commuting patterns. Tables 10 and 11 show the top commuting flows for persons reporting a "usual place of work" or "place of residence" in Gravenhurst, and reveal the following trends regarding labour force commuting⁷:

- Just under half (47%) of residents work within the local community. For those who do not work in Gravenhurst, just under 20% commute to Bracebridge.
- Top recruitment areas for Gravenhurst are Bracebridge, Huntsville, and Orillia.
- Gravenhurst imports 45% of its total workforce with a usual place of work.

There are three important pieces to keep in mind when assessing the data:

- This information is from the 2021 Census from Statistics Canada. The numbers should not be directly contrasted with either Manifold or Lightcast Analyst data, as they are from distinct years and reflect differing methodologies.
- 2. This data is representative of when the Census was taken (spring 2021). As such, commuting data is impacted by COVID-19, leading to a decrease in residents with a "usual place of work". These numbers are valuable as relative measures (i.e., noting communities that supply/recruit the most labour to/from Gravenhurst). However, they likely undercount the total number of commuters to each community.



⁷ Tables 10 and 11 only highlight geographies where at least 50 residents commute into or out of Gravenhurst. Total resident figures include all geographies. Subtotals (male and female) also may not equal totals due to rounding and privacy issues.



3. Commuting figures reflect only those people with a usual place of work. Therein, there will be fewer individuals reflected here compared to total employment, due to the proliferation of non-traditional workspaces.

4. Economic Base Analysis - Gravenhurst

This section investigates the local economy pertinent to Gravenhurst; that is, the jobs and businesses that drive the local economy. This section reports industry statistics related to exports, employment, and business growth for the local economy with the aim of uncovering key industries that either exist or are emerging in the Town today. Section 4 presents this information specifically towards Gravenhurst, while Section 5 replicates this analysis using the Town's "Economic Region," influenced by Commuting Patterns. The economic region consists of the whole of Muskoka.

The "North American Industry Classification System" (NAICS) of classifying industries is used for this report. The largest groupings or aggregations of industry categories are called sectors, which are broken down into subsectors, which are then further broken down into Industries. An example of this breakdown follows:

Sector Level	72 - Accommodation and food services			
Sub-sector Level	722 - Food services and drinking places			
Industry Level	7225 - Full-service restaurants and limited-service eating places

4.1. Employment Profile

The primary employment sectors in Gravenhurst are construction; retail trade; and public administration. Between 2013 and 2023, the economy grew by **1,760 jobs (37%)**. Job growth in the Town was more than double that of the province, where job totals increased by 17% from 2013 to 2023, an impressive figure. Table 12 indicates the representative size of each of these sectors.

Figure 9: Largest Industries by Number of Jobs, 2013 and 2023.

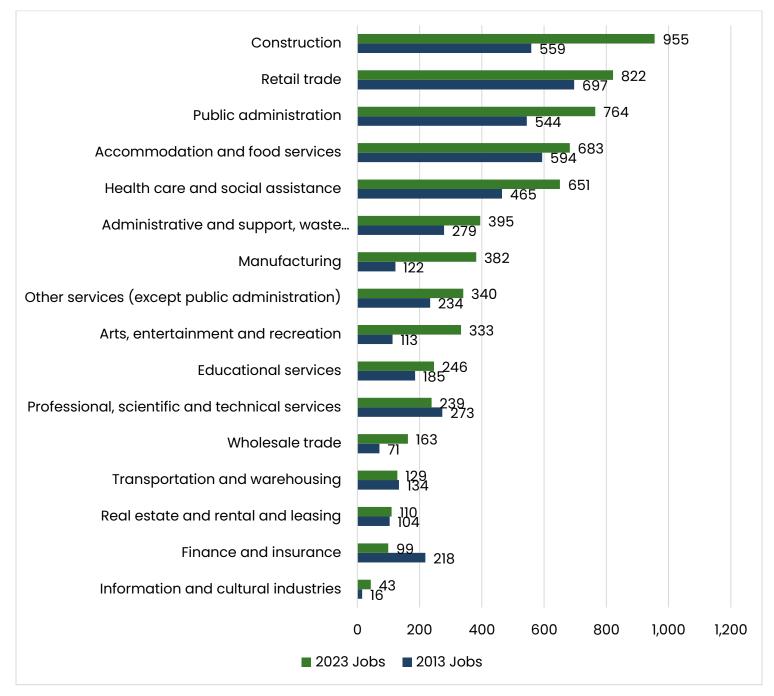






Table 13 breaks job count data into further subcategories, presenting 2013 and 2023 job count figures for the top 20 four-digit industry classifications. Within private sectors, full-service restaurants and limited-service eating places employed the most individuals in Gravenhurst in both 2013 and 2023. Among these top 20 industries, other amusement and recreation industries saw the largest job increase (232 positions).

4.2. Economic Output

This subsection highlights industries with the largest economic impact. Table 14 illustrates industries with the highest level of economic output as measured by total sales. Average wages by industry are also illustrated. The three largest private sector industries are all related to residential construction and real estate in some capacity. Those three private sector industries with the most sales in Gravenhurst are:

- Residential building construction.
- Building equipment contractors.
- Offices of real estate agents and brokers.

4.3. Export Sales

Exports show the amount of money that is spent by industries outside the region (domestically and internationally) in exchange for goods or services produced by an industry located in the Town. In 2021, the most recent data available, total export sales from Gravenhurst amounted to just over \$600 million. Table 15 presents the largest drivers of external revenues into the Town of Gravenhurst.

4.4. Industry Supply Chain Analysis

An economic base analysis analyzes how the local economy functions. It does not provide solutions to economic problems but instead provides useful information required for decision-making about economic strategies.

The economic base analysis helps determine which economic activities "bring money in", and where money might be "leaking out". Another way to assess this metric is to assess the in-region and imported purchases made by each subsector within Gravenhurst. Table 16 presents the top four-digit industries in terms of total purchases made (more than \$5 million in purchases), as well as the percentage of those purchases that are made in-region and out-ofregion.

- Within private industries, **residential construction and related industries** are significant generators of local sales.
- For most of the largest local industries by "purchasing power", **the majority of purchases are made from outside the region.**

4.5. Location Quotient Analysis

Location quotient (LQ) analysis compares the level of employment concentration (or specialization) in a local economy (i.e., Gravenhurst) to the level of employment concentration in one or more benchmark areas. In other words, does the local economy have proportionately more or fewer employees in specific industries than the benchmark area?

LQ helps to identify the strengths of the community. As a reminder, this assessment focuses on jobs in the local economy, not where residents are employed. Table 17 presents LQ data at a 2-digit level, while Tables 18 and 19 present this information at a 4-digit level. The location quotient at the broadest industry classification level indicates that Gravenhurst has the strongest specializations (an LQ of at least 1.2) relative to both the rest of the province and nation in the following sectors:

- Arts, entertainment and recreation.
- Construction.
- Public administration.
- Accommodation and food services.

Direct selling establishments (these are typically "pop-up" short-term merchandise sellers, door-to-door salespeople, or direct fuel wholesalers) are more than 11 times more concentrated in the Town of Gravenhurst compared to both the national and provincial economies. Other amusement and recreation and traveller accommodation industries are also greater than five times more concentrated to both benchmarks, highlighting the importance of tourism businesses to the Town's economy. This data is presented for only those industries employing at least 100 positions.

4.6. Shift-Share Analysis

Shift-share analysis compares the local employment growth/decline of regional jobs by industry to the employment growth/decline of that industry, as well as the job growth overall for Canada. More specifically, this analytical tool examines job growth/decline by attributing growth, stability, or decline in industries over time to three forces:

- National economic growth: regional job growth/decline that is attributable to the growth, stability, or decline of the entire Canadian economy. Industries will be impacted positively or negatively by the state of the Canadian economy and consumer spending at a national level, external to any local factors.
- Industry growth: regional job growth/decline that is attributable to the growth, stability, or decline of that economic activity in the Canadian economy (with the economic growth component removed). General industry trends are outside the influence of local actors and are therefore removed from the local impact.
- Local economic growth: local job growth/decline that is attributable to the local economy because it is growing/declining more or less quickly than jobs in the larger economy (with the Canadian economic and industry growth components removed).

This tool, when correctly interpreted, provides greater descriptive power than the location quotient method. Shift-share analysis allows the examination of changes through time (trends) versus the static snapshot of location quotients.





4.6.1. Shift-Share Analysis within the Local Economy

This subsection assesses which sectors have been most impacted by local factors. The example below applies the model to other amusement and recreation industries:

From 2013 to 2023 this sector saw an increase of 232 jobs in Gravenhurst.

- It would have been expected that the sector increased by 14 positions based on large-scale industry factors regardless of geographic location.
- National economic growth factors would have been expected to lead to small growth (11 jobs) over the same period.
- As such, before accounting for local factors, the sector would have been **expected to gain 25 jobs**.
- Instead, the local sector grew by 232 jobs, suggesting that 207 new jobs can be applied to factors specific to Gravenhurst.

Table 20 allocates employment changes for the industries most positively impacted by local effects to national, industry and regional/local effects.

4.7. Employer Structure

This subsection illustrates the number and size of employers by industry in the Town. The data in this section comes from Statistics Canada's Canadian Business Patterns dataset. Employers in this dataset include businesses in the Business Register, which are all Canadian businesses that meet at least one of the three following criteria:

- Have an employee workforce for which they submit payroll remittances to Canada Revenue Agency.
- Have a minimum of \$30,000 in annual revenue.
- Are incorporated under a federal or provincial act and have filed a federal corporate income tax form within the past three years.

Statistics Canada divides businesses into two major groupings:

- 1. Businesses with a determinate number of employees.
- 2. Businesses with an indeterminate number of employees.

Businesses without employees correspond to the "indeterminate" employment category from the previous reference periods. For economic development purposes, businesses with a determinate number of employees (one or more) are of greater interest than indeterminate businesses (which frequently are not active or have very low levels of economic activity). An increase in the number of indeterminate businesses can, however, signal potential new business startups.

According to the Canadian Business Registry, Gravenhurst had 1,610 businesses as of December 2023, of which 494 (30.7%) had employees. Of these 494 businesses with employees, the majority had between one and nine employees (377 or 76.3%). Comparatively, 19 businesses (3.8%) had over 50 employers. These figures are presented in Table 22.

- Of businesses with at least one employee, 76.3% had fewer than 10 employees.
- This impact from small business is important to highlight because often development is seen as chasing large employers offering hundreds or thousands of jobs. However, local growth and employment are often more a product of small business development.

5. Economic Base Analysis – Economic Region

This section investigates the local economy pertinent to Gravenhurst; that is, the jobs and businesses that drive the local economy. This section replicates the data presented in the previous section, but with a focus on the Town's **Economic Region –** the combined economy of the Census Division of Muskoka (Gravenhurst, Bracebridge, Lake of Bays, Huntsville, Muskoka Lakes, Georgian Bay, Wahta Mohawk Territory, and Moose Point 79). This geography is used due to commuting patterns suggesting it is a relatively accurate portrayal of an economic area that a new business in Gravenhurst can hope to attract talent from within at a consistent basis. The "North American Industry Classification System" (NAICS) of classifying industries is once again used.

5.1. Employment Profile

The primary employment sectors in Gravenhurst's Economic Region are again construction and retail trade. Between 2013 and 2023, the economy grew by **8,700 jobs (29%)**. Job growth in the economic region was slightly lower than in Gravenhurst, but still grew considerably faster than the province (17%). Given the larger size of the region's economy compared to the Town, this rate of growth is as impressive and a strong indicator of local success. Table 24 indicates the representative size of each of these sectors.

Figure 10: Largest Industries by Number of Jobs, 2013 and 2023.

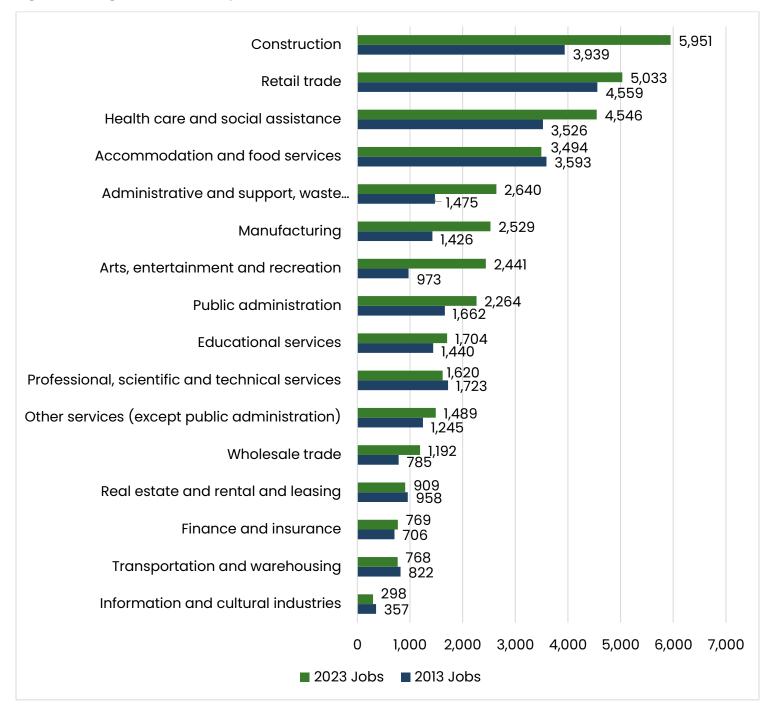

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5.2. Economic Output

This subsection highlights industries with the largest economic impact. Table 26 illustrates industries with the highest level of economic output (over \$100 million in total sales) as measured by total sales. Average wages by industry are also illustrated. The three private sector industries with the most sales in the Economic Region are:

- Residential building construction.
- Veneer, plywood and engineered wood production manufacturing.
- Provincial and territorial public administration.

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5.3. Export Sales

Exports show the amount of money that is spent by industries outside the region (domestically and internationally) in exchange for goods or services produced by an industry located in the Economic Region. In 2021, the most recent data available, total export sales from Gravenhurst's Economic Region amounted to just over \$3.6 billion. Table 27 presents the largest drivers of external revenues into the Economic Region.

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5.4. Industry Supply Chain Analysis

An economic base analysis analyzes how the local economy functions. It does not provide solutions to economic problems but instead provides useful information required for decision-making about economic strategies.

The economic base analysis helps determine which economic activities "bring money in", and where money might be "leaking out". Another way to assess this metric is to assess the in-region and imported purchases made by each subsector within Gravenhurst. Table 28 presents the top four-digit industries in terms of total purchases made (more than \$29 million in purchases), as well as the percentage of those purchases that are made in-region and out-ofregion.

5.5. Location Quotient Analysis

Location quotient (LQ) helps to identify the strengths of the community. As a reminder, this assessment focuses on jobs in the local economic region's economy, not where residents are employed. Table 29 presents LQ data at a 2-digit level, while Tables 30 and 31 present this information at a 4-digit level. The location quotient at the broadest industry classification level indicates that Gravenhurst has the strongest specializations (an LQ of over 1.2) relative to both the rest of the province and nation in the following sectors:

- Arts, entertainment and recreation.
- Construction.
- Accommodation and food services.

At a four digit-NAICS level, the economic region is even more concentrated than Gravenhurst, with multiple industries having location quotients above 10.0. Manufacturing is a prevalent force with regard to concentration in the economic region, compared to provincial and national benchmarks, along with the arts, entertainment and recreation subindustries.

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5.6. Employer Structure

This subsection illustrates the number and size of employers by industry in the Economic Region. The data in this section again comes from Statistics Canada's Canadian Business Registry dataset. For a detailed breakdown of Canadian Business Registry, see Section 4.7.

According to the Canadian Business Registry, the Economic Region had 9,502 businesses as of December 2023, of which 3,125 (32.9%) had employees. Of these 3,125 businesses with employees, once again the majority had between one and nine employees (2,332, or 74.6%), though at a slightly lesser rate than Gravenhurst specifically had. Once again, a small percentage of businesses (3.9%, or 121), had over 50 employers. These figures are presented in Table 34.

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Appendix A: Data Sources

Please note that every effort has been made to use the most current data available. There are four major sources of information for the remainder of this document:

- The 2001 to 2021 Census from Statistics Canada.
- Canadian Business Registry (CBR) December 2021.
- SuperDemographics 2023 from Manifold Data Mining Inc.
- Lightcast Analyst 2024.Q1.

Canadian Business Registry (CBR)

The major sources of information for the business registry are updated from the Statistics Canada survey program and Canada Revenue Agency's (CRA) Business Number account files. This CRA administrative data source allows for the creation of a complete set of all business entities.

Manifold Projection Method

Production of 2023 Demographic data estimates is partially based on population statistics collected by the Statistics Canada Census Program. Manifold estimates demographic data annually, including population projections for 5 and 10 years in the future. Manifold methodologies are based on the following techniques:

Manifold data sources include Statistics Canada, Health Canada, real estate boards/companies, Canadian Bankers Association, Bank of Canada, Canada Post Corporation, consumer and business directories books, flyer distribution associations, regional health ministries, Citizenship and Immigration Canada, regional school boards, proprietary survey and research, and publications of hospitals, and the Canada Mortgage Housing Corporation.





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Lightcast Analyst

Lightcast data brings the various snapshots of the Canadian economy together in a single picture. First, it aligns the geographies of the data from 2001 to the present, which means the Town of Gravenhurst of 2001 is the same as the Town of Gravenhurst of 2024. This results in geographically detailed data (down to the Census Subdivision level) that apply to today's economy.

The data is remarkably detailed, providing information on 305 industry classifications using the North American International Classification System (NAICS) system and 522 occupations from Statistics Canada's National Occupational Classification (NOCs) classification system in over 4,300 integrated geographical areas. The data is updated twice a year, so users have the most current information possible. And to top it all off, it adds 10-year projections based on the CBR data so that it provides an idea of the future alongside the past and present.

Lightcast Data sources include the Canadian Business Registry, 2001-2021 Census data, Survey of Employment, Payroll and Hours, Labour Force Surveys, the Canadian Occupational Projection System, Statistics Canada (CANSIM) Demographics, and Post-secondary student information system education data.
